

Given the importance of Isaac Allerton's role in helping the Plymouth Colony survive, we feel it would be important to place a plaque on or near his verified homestead location.

As we know, and we are still discovering, Isaac Allerton had a pivotal role in the success of the Plymouth settlement. After he completed his efforts there, he went on to help build other communities:


Marblehead, Massachusetts and New Amsterdam (New York City) to name just two.

The Pilgrim Isaac Allerton Society has an interest in placing a plaque or historical marker in one or two of the many locations connected to Isaac Allerton and his family. I was invited to chair the committee tasked with investigating where the current plaques and markers are located and to make suggestions as to where a plaque or plaques might be placed in the future.

With the extensive help of David Russo, our Society Elder, we have located three current locations where plaques can be presently found. Below there is a roadside plaque in Kingston, Massachusetts near 17 Spring Street.



Next, there is a plaque in New Haven, Connecticut in the Grove Street Cemetery.



Finally, there is a plaque in Hull, Massachusetts at the end of Point Allerton Avenue.

Isaac Allerton Family Plaques

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Presently, the 1749 Court House Museum in Plymouth, Massachusetts occupies the site where Isaac and his wife Mary initially made their home in Plymouth. Additionally, as one of the original families in Marblehead, Massachusetts, the committee is encouraging a marker be placed in this town. Placing a marker near the location of Isaac's original homestead in Marblehead near Gas House Beach next to Little Harbor would be most appropriate.

Though we know there will be obstacles to overcome and it will take some time to complete this project, we are excited to start this process. We look forward to celebrating with you in the future as we place a plaque in an appropriate location honoring Isaac Allerton, his wife, and their family. As this process unfolds, we will continue providing updates to our members.

Goals of the Society

- 1. Meet together in Pilgrim fellowship every three years to coincide with the Mayflower Congress.
- 2. Perpetuate and honor the memory of Isaac Allerton and his family; his wives Mary (Norris) Allerton, Fear (Brewster) Allerton; and their children, Bartholomew, Remember, Mary, Sarah and Isaac Allerton, Jr.
- 3. Encourage continued research into the origins of Isaac Allerton and Mary (Norris) Allerton.
- Encourage continued research into the descendants of Isaac Allerton and to discover descendants of his son, Bartholomew Allerton.
- 5. Assist descendants of Isaac Allerton in acquiring acceptable proof of eligibility for membership in the Society.
